
Issue of Concern: HD31 (South Kenai, Homer) - Communities of Interest

Public Comment: The current HD31 is unrepresentative of communities of interest because it links upper Kasilof with Homer. There are two problems with this:

- 1. Kasilof is economically, politically, and geographically dissimilar from communities surrounding Homer. Kasilof is a 15 minute drive South of Soldotna and deserves representation from a consolidated Soldotna/Kenai District, which is where many folks from Kasilof commute to work every day.
- 2. There are communities surrounding Homer far more deserving of being linked to HD31. Just south of Homer and easily accessible by boat are communities in Kachemak Bay State Park. Many folks in Seldovia and Halibut Cove have property and/or live in Homer as well, or commute frequently for business, groceries, etc. These communities are being deprived of representation by being looped into Cordova and Yakutat -- two places you couldn't even get to without first boating to Homer and driving through Southcentral Alaska first. Now that Homer and Kasilof are experiencing disproportionate growth, the population deviation mandate supports splitting them up.

This is a joint community letter of Hooper Bay: City, Native Village, and Sea Lion Corporation (Alaska Native village corporation) supporting that Hooper Bay be part of the Bethel region in 2021 Redistricting.

Bethel is main hub for Y-K Delta villages like Hooper Bay, therefore much of its commerce, health, employment, social and other dealings are within this geographic region.

Much of Hooper Bay's funding for health, housing, social services and programs are usually lumped together with other villages served by Bethel-based businesses and organizations (AVCP, YKHC, AVCP Regional Housing, Community Development Quota- CVRF, etc.)

Commercial airlines that bring passengers and freight are nearly 100% from Bethel and USPO mail and other packages delivery services to Hooper Bay are funneled through Bethel.

From Bethel, the political, semi-political groups, and state & federal agencies and their already affect Hooper Bay (e.g., AVCP Convention, YKHC Tribal Gathering, Y-K Regional Subsistence Board, ADFG, USFWS, etc.)

The Kusilvak Census district is considered part of and always counted with or aligned with the Y-K Delta and least common with Seward Peninsula region, therefore Hooper Bay considers itself as part of the Y-K Delta.

This is an important issue of the people of this region, please consider our concerns.

Written Testimony To the Alaska Redistricting Board From: Sarah Obed, Vice President of External Affairs Doyon, Limited August 24, 2021

Chairman Binkley, and members of the Alaska Redistricting Board. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on the 2020 redistricting process. My name is Sarah Obed. I am President and Chief Executive Officer of Doyon, Limited. I am Koyukon Athabascan, a shareholder of Doyon, and a tribal member of the Native Village of Minto.

Doyon, Limited (Doyon) is the state-chartered, Alaska Native regional corporation established by the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) of 1971, for Interior Alaska. We are headquartered in Fairbanks and have more than 20,000 Alaska Native shareholders. Our mission is to promote the economic and social well-being of our shareholders and future shareholders, to strengthen our Native way of life, and to protect and enhance our land and resources.

Doyon is the largest private landowner in Alaska, with a land entitlement under ANCSA of more than 12.5 million acres. The Doyon Region extends from the Brooks Range in the north to the Alaska Range in the south. The Alaska-Canada border forms the eastern border and the western portion almost reaches the Bering Sea. Doyon and our partners aim to advocate for legislative districts that accurately reflect our region.

Doyon, Tanana Chiefs Conference, Fairbanks Native Association, and Sealaska have been working together to create maps and district planning documents to assist the Board in ensuring our State continues to support Alaska Native and rural representation in our legislative process. Thank you for the opportunity to be here today. You will be hearing from me, and from representatives from our partners and Tribes across Interior Alaska throughout this process.

Our goal is to ensure our elected officials reflect our values, and we seek to hold our leadership accountable to our shared interests and Alaskan values.

Although Doyon has enjoyed prosperous economic growth in the Interior over the last ten years, our region has remained politically fractured because our region has not enjoyed a unified Interior rural house seat that reflects the socioeconomically integrated territory we call God's Country. Instead, villages like McGrath, Evansville, Alatna, Allakaket, Holy Cross, and many others are not socioeconomically integrated with the other communities their legislators currently represent. And, so often, the voices of rural Interior villages are lost to the demographic reality of being included in districts with much more populous non-rural communities with very different interests.

Our team has been working on a map that addresses the fractured apportionment of the Interior region, while remaining cognizant of the effects on, and needs of, the rest of the State. As reflected in our partnership with Sealaska, we understand that choices made for one area of the State may have far reaching impacts. We share the Board's goal of making sure those impacts increase the quality of representation across the State.

Over the coming weeks, we will be presenting the Board with our best effort to build a statewide district map that reflects these goals, but – as you know – the 2020 Census data has only recently become available. Today, as the Board begins its mapping process, our team is presenting an approach to mapping the Interior region that addresses its current fractured apportionment, while allowing flexibility concerning the rest of the State, especially the greater Anchorage area and Mat-Su.

In developing this approach, our team has worked off a few guidelines (beyond just those mandated by law), and we urge the Board to keep them in mind as it goes forward through the redistricting process. We endeavored to keep ANCSA regions intact, to keep river systems intact, and to acknowledge hub communities off the road system. Our map also aims to present minimal deviations from district population targets of 18,335 people represented. Importantly, Doyon also gave consideration to local government boundaries.

The Interior has always functioned as an integrated social and economic unit, which Congress recognized when it passed ANCSA in 1971. Our proposed House Seat 6 reflects this approach, grouping all of the rural villages of the two Interior ANCSA regions (Doyon and Ahtna) into a single integrated district.

Because of the low population density of the Interior, this district will be geographically large. However, given the population change in Fairbanks, this is the only approach to mapping the Interior that makes any sense and is legally defensible. The urban and semi-urban population of Fairbanks makes up almost exactly five house districts representing 18,335 people each. As a practical matter, this means that the rural population of the Interior can be placed together into a single integrated district, as we propose. Otherwise, they must be paired with communities, such as coastal towns and villages in Western Alaska, that are not socially or economically integrated with the Interior.

Our approach also acknowledges the importance of Fairbanks to both the Interior region and the State as a whole. Fairbanks continues to serve as the center of modern economic, educational, social, and cultural activity across our region. It is home to our corporate headquarters, our people, our shareholders, and our beneficiaries. Our mapping effort reflects the population changes in Fairbanks and does not create artificial electoral advantages for any political party. It does, however, clearly and carefully delineate house districts between Fairbanks urban populations and the rural communities of the Interior.

Written Testimony – Supplemental To the Alaska Redistricting Board

Thank you for the opportunity to provide supplemental testimony concerning the maps and accompanying narrative Doyon, Limited (Doyon) – along with our coalition partners – presented to the Board earlier this week.


In our testimony of August 23, 2021, Doyon and our partners discussed desire for an Interior rural house seat. We also presented a map of the Interior region representing a socio-economically integrated set of six House districts covering the Interior region (Doyon and Ahtna) that are contiguous and as compact as possible, given the low population density of the Interior.

During this presentation, members of the Board asked about effective representation of the Interior region under our proposed scenario versus having more representatives across the region. Doyon appreciates these questions and would like to take this opportunity to respond.

Under the current 2013 Amended Proclamation Plan, Interior Alaska is currently "cracked" or "fractured." The Interior constituency is divided between ten House districts. However, with the exception of those districts representing the Fairbanks North Star Borough, the Interior villages and communities are split up such that they are prevented from achieving even a meaningful minority, much less a majority, in any of those districts. Rural Alaska is not monolithic on issues and we have found that Interior Alaska issues suffered under the 2013 Amended Proclamation Plan.

The current map combines Interior communities with house districts which represent the North Slope, both Western and Southwestern Alaska (including the Aleutians), the Mat-Su, and parts of Prince William Sound, including:

- Bettles, Allakaket and Hughes are included in with the North Slope in District 40;
- Huslia, Galena, Nulato, Ruby, Koyukuk, and Kaltag are included in with West Coast communities in District 39;
- Grayling, Nicolai, Shageluk, Takotna, McGrath, Anvik, and Holy Cross are included with Bristol Bay communities in District 37; and
- Delta Junction, Deltana, and Fort Greely are included with the Mat-Su and Prince William Sound.




MAP: 2013 Proclamation House District Interior Map

To understand the depth of this problem, we have analyzed voter turnout data for the precincts in which Doyon shareholders live. The following tables are from our unpublished accounting of voter impact.

District 39: Average Turnout by Precinct (2014-2018 General Election)

Average Turnout by Precinct (District 39) 2014-2018 General Elections




This graphic shows that the votes from the precincts in Galena, Hulia, Kaltag, Koyukuk, Nulato, and Ruby are well exceeded by just three other precincts in District 39 (two Nome Precincts and Unalakleet's precinct). This is despite the fact that Doyon Shareholders in District 39 had a 65% voter turnout in 2016.

We find a similar, if not more pronounced example in District 37:

District 37: Average Turnout by Precinct

Here, we see that the votes from the precincts in seven villages within the Doyon Region (Anvik, Grayling, Holy Cross, McGrath, Nikoli, Shageluk, and Takota) are well exceeded by just one precinct, Aleutians No. 2. In this case, the voter turnout in almost every Doyon Region Village was higher than Aleutians No. 2, but even if the precincts within the Doyon Region were to vote at 100% voter turnout, they would still be unable to elect, or even meaningfully help to elect, their preferred representative.

The map we presented earlier this week also addresses a similar, but not identical, issue within the Interior region itself. As the Board is well aware, the Interior Region is comprised of the relatively urban area within Fairbanks and the Fairbanks North Star Borough, and many small, rural villages and communities. Currently, those rural villages and communities that are not split off into non-Interior districts are represented by current House District 6, which includes a substantial urban Fairbanks population. In fact, the rural villages and communities of the Doyon region included within current District 6 only have a population of around 6,000 people – around one third of the ideal district size. This means that the rural population cannot elect their preferred representative, even in the supposedly "rural" Interior seat.

The rural villages and communities of the Interior represent a single socially integrated area. We seek a rural Interior House seat that reflects this area and ensures fair representation for these rural areas without overwhelming their votes with a majority population of Greater Fairbanks residents.

We look forward to presenting a fully drawn statewide map in the upcoming Alaska Redistricting Board meeting.

I am here today to talk about Senate districts M and N, both of which bisect East and South Anchorage and pair the bisected portions together in a way that creates under-representation for both East and South Anchorage residents. South Anchorage and East Anchorage have issues and concerns that differ greatly from each other, both geographically and economically, and the senate districts M and N should be redrawn to reflect this and to allow both South Anchorage and East Anchorage to be represented in a way that is more cohesive and that will allow their representatives to better hone in and focus on the issues affecting their districts. Combining districts 25M and 27N together into one district, as well as districts 26M and 28N, with boundaries adjusted as necessary to account for population differences, would more appropriately follow our State Constitution's directive that districts be formed of a relatively integrated socio-economic area and be comprised of two contiguous house districts and would ultimately lead to better quality representation for both East Anchorage and South Anchorage residents.



A DELICATE DANCE

Alaska's Constitution establishes 4 redistricting principles for new districts. They are to be:


- **1.** Compact having a small perimeter in relation to the area encompassed. Compact districting should not yield bizarre designs. The Alaska Supreme Court looks to the relative compactness of proposed and possible districts in determining whether a district is sufficiently compact.
- **2.** Contiguous reachable from every other part of the district, islands allowed but open sea is not without limit
- 3. <u>Socio-Economically Integrated</u> where people live together and work together and earn their living together. It has been described as occurring when a group of people live within a geographic unit, following, if possible, similar economic pursuits.
- 4. Equal Population 733,391 / 40 = 18,335 "as near as practicable" for Alaska law, 10% total deviation allowed under Federal law,

A DYNAMIC TENSION

- In some cases the 4 Constitutional criteria collide as the following challenges and map examples will show
- Only the Board can determine how best to resolve the dynamic tension between competing redistricting requirements
- Legal Counsel is on-hand to assist as needed
- Case law has clarified some points, but many tradeoffs are matters of judgement


A NATURAL TEMPTATION

- Because population numbers are empirical and precise, it's natural for map drawers to focus on "getting the numbers right" and look past the more nuanced criteria which require experience, judgement and reflection to properly assess: no simple answers
- Our first public map submission (anonymous) is a perfect example:
- Excellent population deviations, just 0.63% total deviation across all 40 districts
- Likely that this is the smallest possible deviation given the Census blocks contain more than one person each




EXPERIENCE COUNTS

- There are 28,568 Census blocks in Alaska
- Technically there are millions of possible plans
- Alaska's vast size means there are many distinct socio-economic regions
- Alaska's vast size poses significant compactness challenges
- These factors restrict the number of Constitutionally balanced and practicable plans to few
- These practicable plans hinge on a short list of key challenges
- Board guidance on these points will reduce the number of possible plans from thousands to dozens or less

SOUTHEAST CHALLENGES

- Southeast Alaska as a region contains 72,254 people, enough for 3.91 seats.
- Results in an under population of 1,050 people total
- Spread across 4 districts mean each district would need to be 260 persons low, or 1.4% below ideal
- Do we combine population from Cordova with Southeast?
- Do we include population from the Copper River Valley?
- Cordova has 2,600 people. Adding to Southeast results in overpopulation of 1,500+, or about 2% above ideal per district
- Copper River Valley socio-economically distinct from Southeast



GULF COAST CHALLENGES

- Cordova has 2,600 people, Valdez has 4,000, Seward has 5,000, Kodiak has 13,000: Total 24,600 = not possible to combine
- Cordova, Seward and Kodiak combined is 20,600
- Combining the Kenai Peninsula, Kodiak, and Cordova results in overpopulation of about 1.9% per district (+340 average across 4 districts)
- The neighboring Aleutian Islands district to the west is underpopulated
- Assigning Tyonek/Beluga to the Aleutians district reduces the overpopulation in the Kenai area by 600 people (350 overage averages down to 200 per district for an overpopulation average decrease from 1.9% to 1.2%).
- Do we include Tyonek/Beluga with the Aleutians district?




NORTHWEST CHALLENGES

- Growth in the North Slope, Bethel and Nome regions is offset by losses in the Interior and Dillingham and Bristol Bay areas.
- Hooper Bay requests to be added to Bethel district, but adding 1,000 people to Bethel, which is already over populated, necessitates losses of other upriver Bethel region communities.
- The Dillingham/Aleutian Islands district lost population.
 Additional population may be found to the East (Tyonek), North (Kaltag, Galena, Ruby, Nulato) or West (Good News Bay, Platinum).
- Is it possible to redistrict some areas to better reflect historical socio-economic ties between interior communities while rebalancing the population changes?


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
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
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CONCLUSION
